Centennial Spotlight

A Town and Club are Born...

Signal Mountain's golf course opened for play in 1916 as an additional amenity to the Signal Mountain Inn, which had opened in 1913. It was only the second course to be built in the Chattanooga area and was part of a golf course building boom that saw the number of U.S. courses almost triple in a seven year span. Signal's course opened shortly before such classics as Pine Valley and Pebble Beach (opened in 1919) and Winged Foot (1923).

One of the unintended and interesting outcomes of the building of Signal's course was the creation of our town government.

For many years before the opening of the Inn and the golf course, farmers from throughout Hamilton and Sequatchie counties would drive their cattle to the mountain and let them spend the summer here. Once the course opened, its wide open spaces and acres of grass attracted the livestock to the course and to the part of the mountain where most residents lived (the neighborhood we know today as "Old Town"). This was before the town of Signal Mountain was incorporated, so there were no local ordinances to prevent this from happening at the time.

The residents - and presumably Mr. James, the owner of the course - wanted to do something about this nuisance, so the community requested a town charter from the state legislature. The charter was granted, and the Town of Signal Mountain was incorporated in April, 1919. Mr. James was elected as the first mayor of the town, along with a Board of Commissioners. Specifically to keep the animals off the golf course, their first action was to pass an ordinance forbidding animals from roaming freely in the town limits, and the town's first employee's job was to round up and impound any stray animals.

While the course was built for the guests of the Inn, there obviously was a group of local residents who developed a love for the game, as well. In February of 1922, the Signal Mountain Golf and Country Club was incorporated. There are no records of the exact date when Mr. James transferred the ownership of the course to the new club, but it stands to reason that it would have taken place sometime in or very close to 1922. At some point early on, a new clubhouse was built on the site of our current one, to replace the original clubhouse, which was behind the present-day 13th green.

The founding of our club took place at a time of major developments in the world of golf. In 1922, two legends of the game captured major championships. Gene Sarazen won the U.S. Open, his first major victory on his way to the career Grand Slam, and Walter Hagen won the Open Championship, becoming the first native-born American to do so. Also in 1922, the first Walker Cup match was contested between leading amateurs from the U.S and Great Britain and Ireland. The great Bobby Jones captured the 1922 Southern Amateur, and the next year, he won the first of his four U.S. Opens and his then-record 13 major championships.

We may not know the names of the founders of SMGCC, but we owe them a debt of gratitude for having the vision to start the club that is now 100 years old. In 1922, with golf exploding in popularity and the cows no longer grazing on the greens, the future looked bright for the new club on the mountain. Little did they know that rough times lay ahead.

As previously announced, SMGCC will install our new Centennial Clock this spring near the flag pole, putting green, and first tee. It will be 11.5' tall with a double-sided face, and the fund-raising for the clock is underway. We thank the many members who already have donated toward the clock and encourage those who have not donated yet to make a contribution. This is a great way to participate in our centennial celebration and commemorate our club's first 100 years with a beautiful addition to our grounds.

Putts From The Fringe

It has been a busy winter and spring for us and I am very ready to get to growing some grass again. Our greens are healing from aeration well and we are seeing the benefits from the drainage restoration project and Drill and Fill. Our greens are taking heavy rainfall better than I have ever seen and I am very happy with the results from those projects. The greens are still not putting the way that I would like but there are several factors working against smooth greens. Along with needing a light topping of sand, it is also a transition period for the poa and bentgrass in our greens. The products we use to reduce seedheads on the greens also promote a variable growth rate between the two grasses which will make the greens a little bumpy. I think our greens are ahead of last year's schedule and we can expect better putting surfaces than we saw last year very soon.

The weed (poa) problem on our green surrounds has been difficult to manage because of the limited number of herbicides that we can safely use around the greens. The product that we used last year did not pack the punch that we needed, I have been working with the herbicide extension specialist at UTK to come up with an aggressive program that appears to be working so far. Between this program and some new management strategies, our goal is that you will be able to hit the shot around the greens that you want to hit without worrying about bad grass getting in the way.

We are currently in the middle of a project to drain the water feature that forms in 1 fairway after a rain. The project requires dodging water lines while going uphill and through the mountain. The timing of starting the project before rain was bad and honestly the execution of the project could have been better. The goal is to be able to drain the area without having to pump the water through the parking lot. We have made a mess but this is an old problem and if we can fix it I think the scars will be worth it. Unless I can break through the rock by banging my head on it, the project will be on hold until it is dry enough to get the skid steer and rock breaker attachment out there to punch through more rock.

Thank you for your continued support and patience, 2022 has been a very busy year and I think we will start seeing the benefits from the work we have done soon. Please download the Clubster App for more updates.

Reminders for a fun round of golf at a steady pace of play:

- 1. Carry an extra ball in your pocket.
- 2. The player who is ready should hit; have your group watch where each shot goes. When a ball is lost, hit your ball FIRST and then help look for the lost ball; 3-minute max.
- 3. Go to your ball as soon as safely possible, so that you can choose your club and think about the shot in ADVANCE of your turn.
- 4. Park carts and place extra clubs so that they don't interfere with incoming shots.
- 5. On the Green, line up your putt BEFORE it's your turn and if you are not in someone else's line, putt out immediately instead of marking. Leave the Green immediately after you've holed out or picked up and proceed to the next tee. Complete your scorecard after you're away from the Green.

No need to rush thru your round; the goal should be to keep up with the group in front of you. Now, let's go play!
